3rd grade and remembers having fun with his friends cutting the colored glass tiles and gluing them together.

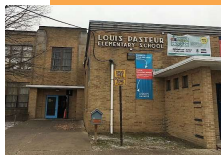

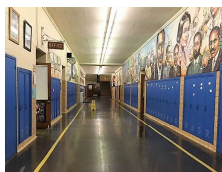

Pasteur was built in 1931 and had 548 students.
There are now 380 students.
In 1951, an addition was built that included the gym, auditorium, and three classrooms.
In 1955, the homemaking room, the industrial arts room and a "modern" cafeteria were added.
The homemaking room is now the office for the Climate and Culture team. The industrial arts room is now Ms. King's science room. The cafeteria in the gym is still used today.
The Pasteur News was sold for 2 cents.
What's Poppin' Pasteur is being sold for a penny.

Poetry and Music
